
The ever-popular pickleball tournaments were at The Family Life Center, 1415 South Topeka.

## Sherri Flippo Honored With 2017 Irene Hart Award

In the field of aging services, Sherri Flippo is a legend in her own right. As the leader of the Meals on Wheels program at Senior Services for over three decades, she devotes herself to ensure the safety and well-being of over 1500 homebound seniors every year and makes sure 800-900 meals get out in a timely manner every weekday.

In May, Sherri's 37 years of extraordinary service to seniors was honored when she was named the recipient of the 2017 Irene Hart award, presented annually by the Central Plains Area Agency on Aging for an individual who has made a significant contribution in the field of aging.

In addition to supervising seven staff members, Sherri works closely with the volunteer coordinator to maintain the more than 400 volunteers who deliver the meals. She is a long-time member of the Wichita TRIAD, which works to prevent elder abuse, the Hoarding Task Force, and was instrumental in the implementation of Mid-Kansas Senior Outreach. When the Senior Companion program started, she coordinated the senior companions assigned to Senior Services. She makes sure Senior Services clients are connected with Operation Holiday and LIEAP, distributing donated items like fans and



loaning medical equipment to those in need.

A licensed social worker with a degree from Wichita State University, Sherri says modestly it is service to others which draws her to her job. The notoriety of Meals of Wheels enables Sherri and her staff to inform people coming into the program about other programs and assistance from which they might benefit.

"We are really able to help," she says. To her, that is what life is all about.

Sherri takes her responsibility seriously, spending late hours and weekends checking on the welfare of clients who didn't answer their door that day.

"Over the years, thousands of seniors have benefitted from the passion and dedication of Sherri Flippo, who has a big heart for our seniors," says Laurel Alkire, executive director of Senior Services.
